## Fretless is for Sale

Fretless is a 1991 Rhodes 22 manufactured by General Boats, Edenton, NC. The boat was recycled in 1998 by General Boats with new sails, a new paint job, and single cabintop hatch installed over the head.

She has all of the standard Rhodes 22 features: in-mast furling main, furling jib, 6-1 manual motor lift, galley, semi-enclosed head with portapotty, poptop, opening front ports, shore power, positive flotation, large comfortable cockpit and many, many extras.

She has cruised the Chesapeake and for many years was continuously upgraded with a Doyle UPS (Utility Power Sail - red white & blue sail to right - 2003), new galvanized trailer (2007), an electric start Yamaha 8 HT (2007), new vertical batten mainsail (2010), new poptop enclosure (2010).

Fretless has been kept in a slip in Rock Hall, MD for the last 15 years and stored covered on her trailer in the winter. We launch and retrieve her ourselves and other than having the bottom professionally painted, and the engine serviced, we do most of the maintenance ourselves. The boat has been very lightly used the last 4 years and it has become apparent that it is time for us to move on. We have bought a powerboat and are offering Fretless for sale in hopes that someone will love her as much as we have.

A bittersweet picture - coming home from what was probably our last cruise aboard Fretless in 2014. You can see 2 of the 3 sheeting options on Fretless (most Rhodes have only 2.) There is the regular genoa track on the cockpit coamings OR move the sheets inboard of the shrouds through the fairlead on a track alongside the cabin OR move the sheets inboard of the lower stays to the cabin top for an even closer sheeting angle.

The Doyle UPS sail is a great addition. It is spinnaker cloth and sets and furls on its own hightech rope luff with a minifurler. The sail is easy to deploy, has its own sheets and halyard and is great fun off the wind and can be used well above a beam reach. It is a great light air and downwind sail. This photo shows the earlier mainsail.



This photo shows the cockpit controls for the outboard mounted to a spare cockpit table leg. We always meant to cut down the leg but found that we liked being able to leave the controls in place and just set the table on top at anchor. We do have another table leg if you would rather set it up without the controls. The whole unit can stow under the seat when sailing to clear the cockpit. You can also see the cockpit cushions and Fretless's unique blue and easy on the eyes cockpit floor.
